John Nott, Founder of Glastonbury Connecticut, Representative, New England Confederation 1617-1681 + John Nott II, Judge of Hartford/Wethersfield Court, Firstborn feudal heir + John Nott, Firstborn heir + Thomas Nott, Rightful heir, younger brother to two Navy ship Captains who fought the British in the Revolutionary war.
